## New Home in Kitale

We are delighted to let you know of the opening of our new home and rehabilitation centre for street children in the northern town of Kitale. We have been working on the streets there for over 12 months, building relationships with street children and learning about their lives and their needs. Vincent and his



wife, Rose, who run the program, identified a house that could become our first rehabilitation centre for the children of Kitale they had met on the streets. Over the course of the last three months they have prepared the house, through donations gratefully received, making beds, buying equipment and food. In July, the first four street children were brought into the home to begin a new life away from the streets.



## Harvest Thanksgiving



This year we began a new program in Kitale, running a three acre farm, planted with Maize. This is the start of a three year project that will see the Trust become self sustaining in food production.

The farm is managed by Vincent, who is, by training, a teacher of Agriculture and the first harvest received this year was fantastic. For an initial investment of

just £700 we have reaped over £1,500 worth of Maize. This is enough to sustain all of our programs throughout the coming year. For 2006, we have increased the land usage to 6 acres, with a plan to use 10 acres in 2007. The yield from this should generate all of the food we that require for the work on the streets, with enough profit from the sales of surplus to enable a full replanting. We are especially grateful for the rich harvest given the famine currently being experienced in parts of Eastern and Northern Kenya. Indeed, we have been able to donate maize to some of the most hard hit areas, saving lives with food aid.



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## Charles Goes Home

Charles, at 14 years of age, was the eldest of the first group of boys that came into our street rehabilitation program in Kisumu. He had been on the streets for many months, living rough and scavenging what food he could find. He first came into the rehabilitation centre in Kibos in January 2003 and has made rapid and wonderful progress, turning away from his old, street life. Charles made a huge effort at school and worked with the program leaders to begin a new life. As part of the program of rehabilitation, boys are encouraged to visit their homes and build relationships with whatever family they have. For some boys this can



initially be daunting, but for many it is a chance to better understand themselves and their roots. For Charles, it proved even more than that. On returning home, he found that his Mother whom he thought had died after she left home was still alive and had returned. She had feared that Charles was dead and, despite searching for him, had not managed to find him. To see Charles, so well cared for and with a new outlook on life brought tears to her eyes. Charles, soon after, made the decision that he would like to return home to live. Nicky and Moses have since visited Charles back in his home, far from Kisumu near to the Uganda border and were delighted to find him so happy to be back. We are all thrilled that Charles has found his close and loving family, and pray that he will continue in his new found happiness.



## Hope Centre

The Trust, continuing its work on the streets of Kisumu city, has opened a new base in the streets. Hope Centre is a former cafe building, which can hold up to 60 children at any time. It is staffed 5 days a week by volunteers and workers, and on three of those days literacy programs and maths classes are run by the Trust's staff, along



with the provision of health care facilities. Hope centre has been incredibly well received by the street boys who attend it and the workers have been able to build friendship and trust with the children. Word about the centre is spreading around Kisumu too. On a recent visit we were surprised to find a group of people there from Interfelk (the International Fellowship of Kenya), an organisation who run schools for disadvantaged children. On seeing the classes that were being run and the ability of street boys they have agreed to take a number of them into their schools! A wonderful example of co-operation between organisations with similar goals and one that we are working hard on the ground to encourage.
